

The SAMHSA rule on opioid treatment presents an unprecedented opportunity to improve access to patient-centered care, to improve quality of life for people seeking treatment, which can ultimately mean more people seek treatment.

- Over the last 20 years, there has been an evolution in treatment and accreditation practices for SUD therapies.
- Research has shown that the benefits of take-home flexibilities implemented during the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency had a net positive impact.
- Lack of access and stigma remain as the two biggest barriers to treatment.

ELEMENTS OF SAMHSA RULE*





PATIENT INTAKE

- » New admission criteria reduce barriers to care
- Defines the initial medical examination, including the screening and the full history and physical
- Clarifies the initial and periodic physical and behavioral health assessments



CARE DELIVERY

- >>> Telehealth options* available for patients treated with buprenorphine (audio/video or audio only) or methadone (audio/video only)
- » Qualified practitioners now include PAs, NPs, clinical nurse specialists, certified nurse anesthetists, and certified nurse midwives



DOSING

- Increases allowable take-home doses
- Defines and specifies indications for split dosing
- >> Expands interim maintenance



HARM REDUCTION

- >> Harm reduction is a best practice for person-centered care
- >>> Providers should offer naloxone, fentanyl test strips, and other education and counseling
- Cannot deny OUD medication if patient refuses counseling offered

Total abstinence is not necessarily the goal

Perspective:

Does this create more patient centered care?

- >> This rule mostly formalizes changes made over years to make the system work better for the patient.
 - >> The biggest changes are around telehealth and take-home doses, both of which can increase access to treatment.
- >> To make treatment work better for patients, stakeholders must come together to improve access and reduce barriers...states making policy, payers designing incentives, providers working with patients.
 - Payers must create the right incentives to change behavior
 - States must implement rules that help patients and the system achieve their goals.

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
