


Why are We Here Today?

Based on the most recent CDC data, drug overdose deaths exceeded 100,000 for the first time ever in a 12-month period (data from April of 2020 to April of 2021).


12 Month-ending Provisional Number and Percent Change of Drug Overdose Deaths

Why Engage Industries?



While 75% of US employers are affected by employee use of opioids, only 17% of US employers are well prepared to handle employees with opioid use in the workplace.¹



The total employer costs of the opioid crisis in the U.S. was estimated to be nearly \$150 billion between 2015 and 2018, including increased spending on health care, lost productivity, and increased disability and worker's compensation claims.²

Personal care and service








Overdose Deaths and Industries

In 2019:

- 16.9% of overdose deaths in Delaware were among individuals working in the Construction industry, while 5.9% were among individuals working in jobs related to Installation, Maintenance, and Repair
- 9.6% of overdose deaths in Delaware were among individuals working in the Food Service industry

Engagement of Key Stakeholders

- Identify key anchor stakeholders/entities within the highly impacted industries (e.g., trade organizations, local unions)
- Conduct listening and engagement sessions with these stakeholders that include:
 - Discussion of their perceptions of OUD/SUD within their industry (who is most impacted, what are the contributing issues, what have they done previously (if anything), what support do they need)
 - Social network analysis to identify additional stakeholders who need to be engaged
- Develop and share an action plan with SMART goals for feedback and buy in





Successful Engagement Strategies



Grassroots Outreach

- Door-to-door strategy for restaurants
- Social Network Analysis



Partnerships with Trusted Industry Leaders

 In Delaware, partnerships with the Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC) and the Delaware Contractors Association (DCA) have led to naturally extending partnerships with employers



Meet Each Stakeholder Where They Are

- In many cases, industries haven't been engaged in this way before
- Education and stigma reduction is a part of outreach
- Flexibility is key



Easy-to-Access and Use Materials

 Employers have many other areas of focus, so our work involves making sure materials are provided in real time and are easy-to-find/use when they are top of mind



Multi-Pronged Intervention:

Education, Stigma Reduction, and Harm Reduction

Support for Employees

- Broadscale education about impact of OUD within industry and available resources
 - Formal trainings of varying lengths
 - E-communications and flyers
- Overdose response training and naloxone distribution
- Stigma Reduction
- Peer Support



Employer Toolkit for Construction

State-level studies have found that construction workers are six to seven times more likely to die from an opioid overdose than workers in other professions.

The physical demands of construction jobs are unavoidable. Pain, injury, and disability can lead to addiction and overdose. The loss of lives — not to mention the costs associated with the loss of safety, productivity, and retention — mandate a plan of action.

DRUG OVERDOSES ARE ON THE RISE.

The top two Industries for men who died of a drug overdose were the construction and the installation, maintenance, and repair industries.¹ From 2011 to 2018, construction workers who died at work due to unintentional overdose increased about nine times, more than double the growth in all other industries.² Nearly half of the overdose fatalities on construction worksites were caused by nonmedical drugs (47.3%).

Workplaces are paying the price.



Safety

Opioid use is associated with more injuries.



Absenteeism

A loss of 50% more work time.



Loss of productivity

Estimated to cost more than \$400 billion.



Lower job retention

Those with substance use or opioid use disorders change jobs more frequently than does the general workforce.



Higher health care spend

Costs are three times higher for those who misuse prescription drugs.

Protect and support your employees with this toolkit.

You play an important role in saving lives through the adoption of workplace policies, training, and practices. This toolkit provides guidance and recommendations to help Delaware construction employers support their employees through prevention, treatment, and recovery from opioid misuse and opioid use disorder (OUD).





Support for Employers

Restaurant Accolade Program



- General managers and human resources personnel receive training and support in developing policies and procedures that create an accepting environment for individuals in recovery, combat the stigma of addiction, and promote a drug-free workplace.
- DPH works with these personnel to assess restaurants' current policies and environment and provide tailored assistance to these individuals.
- Restaurants who complete the Gold Level training receive a Gold Award, along with a certificate of achievement and a Gold window-cling decal and an award to be featured in the establishment



- One to two individuals in the restaurant are trained to be peer supporters for their co-workers. These individuals are educated by DPH about opioids, addiction, and overdose, as well as key strategies to reduce stigma against individuals with substance use disorder.
- Peer supporters also will be educated about local treatment options and resources for individuals with substance use disorders so that they can support and assist co-workers who may be in need of these services.
- Restaurants who complete the Silver Level training receive a certificate of achievement and a Silver window-cling decal for the establishment



- Key staff are trained in how to recognize the signs of an opioid overdose, administer NARCAN® nasal spray, and connect with Emergency Medical Services (EMS) for additional assistance.
- All trained staff members and the establishment receive a personal Opioid Rescue Kit.
- Restaurants who complete the Bronze Level training receive a certificate of achievement and a Bronze window-cling decal to identify the establishment as a member of the Restaurant Accolade Program








CDC's Overdose Data to Action (OD2A)

CDC's OD2A

- CDC launched the multiyear Overdose Data to Action
 (OD2A) cooperative agreement in September 2019 with 66
 recipients comprising state, territorial, county, and city
 health departments.
- Two-pronged approach:
 - Surveillance: morbidity, mortality, and innovative surveillance strategies.
 - Prevention: PDMP, State and local integration, linkages to care, provider and health systems support, partnerships with public safety, first responders, empowering individuals and innovative preventive strategies.
- Peer to peer learning.
